7. STATEMENT OF REASONS

Description of the development

Material Change of Use for a Dwelling House (Building Envelope)

Reasons for Decision

- a) Assessment of the development against the relevant zone purpose, planning scheme codes and planning scheme policies demonstrates that the proposed development will not cause significant adverse impacts on the surrounding natural environment, built environment and infrastructure, community facilities, or local character and amenity; and
- b) On balance, the application should be approved because the circumstances favour Council exercising its discretion to approve the application even though the development does not comply with an aspect of the assessment benchmarks.

Assessment Benchmarks

The development was assessed against the following assessment benchmarks:

- Local Government Infrastructure Plan;
- Strategic Framework;
- Rural Zone Code;
- Access, Parking and Transport Code;

Strategic Framework

3.3 Settlement Pattern

3.3.6 Element - Rural

3.3.6.1 Specific Outcome (3)

The proposed development does not comply with Specific Outcome (3) of the Rural designation as the subject site is encompassed by the Special Management Area Overlay and proposes the establishment of a new sensitive land use (Dwelling House).

The purpose of the Special Management Area Overlay is to identify areas that may be impacted upon by industrial or landfill activities.

The subject site, whilst encompassed by this overlay is not in proximity to an industrial or landfill activity and is located approximately 3.5 kilometres south west of the Stanwell Power Station, which is a significant separation distance, providing an effective natural buffer for residents to mitigate any potential air, light, noise or odour emissions that may be generated from the land use.

Furthermore, the proposed development does comply on balance with the remaining relevant overall outcomes of the Settlement Pattern theme (Rural designation) because:

- The proposed building envelope meets the requirements for a Dwelling House within the Rural Zone; and
- The subject site is not affected by the Agricultural Land Class overlay and the Dwelling House will not alienate or impact on the productive agricultural capacity of rural areas.

Therefore, on balance the proposed development is not anticipated to compromise the Strategic Framework of the *Rockhampton Region Planning Scheme 2015*.

Special Management Overlay

8.2.10.2 Purpose

(2), (c); and

Performance Outcome (PO) 1

The proposed development does not comply with the following Overall Outcome of the Special Management Area Overlay Code Purpose:

(c) the establishment of new or the further intensification (except for minor alterations or extensions) of existing sensitive land use(s) does not occur: Or:

Acceptable Outcome (AO) 1.2 which states: No new dwelling house(s) to be established.

The Dwelling House is proposed on land identified as an area that may be impacted upon by industrial or landfill activities, specifically the Stanwell Power Station, which is a key economic asset.

Strategic Framework theme 3.8 Natural resources and economic development of the Strategic Framework under 3.8.8 Element – Protection of key assets and 3.8.2.1 Specific outcome (1) states: that key economic assets are protected from encroachment of incompatible development and supported to continue and grow their primary function.

The Dwelling House is not considered to encroach on the ability or primary function of the Stanwell Power Station because:

- The Dwelling House will be located approximately 3.5 kilometres southwest of the Stanwell Power Station, which is a significant separation distance, providing an effective natural buffer for residents to mitigate any potential air, light, noise or odour emissions that may be generated from the land use.
- The site is surrounded by similar residential land uses;
- The site's location is within close proximity of the township of Stanwell to the South and West that is not affected by the Special Management Area Overlay and closer to the power station than the proposed development site; and
- Dwelling Houses are a passive, consistent land use within the Rural designation.

Therefore, the development is not anticipated to be detrimental to the continued protection of the Stanwell Power Station and will not compromise the Strategic Framework of the *Rockhampton Region Planning Scheme 2015.*

Relevant Matters

The proposed development was not assessed against any relevant matters outside of the matters prescribed by regulation.

Matters raised in submissions

The proposal was the subject of public notification between 9 June 2025 and 30 June 2025, in accordance with the requirements of the Planning Act 2016 and the Development Assessment Rules, and no submissions were received.

Matters prescribed by regulation

- The Rockhampton Region Planning Scheme 2015 (version 5);
- Central Queensland Regional Plan 2013; and
- The common material, being the material submitted with the application.

8. APPEAL RIGHTS

The rights of an applicant to appeal to a tribunal or the Planning and Environment Court against a decision about a development application are set out in chapter 6, part 1 of the *Planning Act 2016*. There may also be a right to make an application for a declaration by a tribunal (see chapter 6, part 2 of the *Planning Act 2016*).

Appeal by an applicant

An applicant for a development application may appeal to the Planning and Environment Court against the following:

- the refusal of all or part of the development application
- a provision of the development approval
- the decision to give a preliminary approval when a development permit was applied for
- a deemed refusal of the development application.

An applicant may also have a right to appeal to the Development tribunal. For more information, see schedule 1 of the *Planning Act 2016*.

The timeframes for starting an appeal in the Planning and Environment Court are set out in section 229 of the *Planning Act 2016*.

Attachment 2 is an extract from the *Planning Act 2016* that sets out the applicant's appeal rights and the appeal rights of a submitter.

Attachment 1 – Part 1 Rockhampton Regional Council Conditions

Planning Act 2016

1.0 ADMINISTRATION

- 1.1 The owner, the owner's successors in title, and any occupier of the premises is responsible for ensuring compliance with the conditions of this development approval.
- 1.2 Where these Conditions refer to "Council" in relation to requiring Council to approve or to be satisfied as to any matter, or conferring on the Council a function, power or discretion, that role may be fulfilled in whole or in part by a delegate appointed for that purpose by the Council.
- 1.3 All conditions, works, or requirements of this development approval must be undertaken and completed:
 - 1.3.1 to Council's satisfaction;
 - 1.3.2 at no cost to Council; and
 - 1.3.3 prior to the commencement of the use,

unless otherwise stated.

- 1.4 The following further Development Permits must be obtained prior to the commencement of any works associated with their purposes:
 - 1.4.1 Plumbing and Drainage Works; and
 - 1.4.2 Building Works.
- 1.5 All Development Permits for Plumbing and Drainage Works must be obtained prior to the issue of a Development Permit for Building Works.
- 1.6 All works must be designed, constructed and maintained in accordance with the relevant Council policies, guidelines and standards, unless otherwise stated.
- 1.7 All engineering drawings/specifications, design and construction works must be in accordance with the requirements of the relevant Australian Standards and must be approved, supervised and certified by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland.

2.0 APPROVED PLANS AND DOCUMENTS

2.1 The approved development must be completed and maintained generally in accordance with the approved plans and documents, except where amended by any condition of this development approval:

2.2 Where there is any conflict between the conditions of this development approval and the details shown on the approved plans and documents, the conditions of this development approval must prevail.

3.0 ACCESS WORKS

3.1 A new access driveway must be constructed for the proposed Dwelling House from the Griffith Street.

Note: A Works in Road Reserve Permit (including a fee for the vehicle crossover and compliant with Standard *Capricorn Municipal Development Guideline* Drawings) may be accepted.

3.2 All access works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines and Australian Standard AS2890 "Parking facilities".

4.0 PLUMBING AND DRAINAGE WORKS

- 4.1 A Development Permit for Plumbing and Drainage Works must be obtained for the proposed new dwelling house on the development site.
- 4.2 All internal plumbing and drainage works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines, Water Supply (Safety and Reliability) Act 2008, Plumbing and Drainage Act 2018, Council's Plumbing and Drainage Policies and the provisions of a Development Permit for Plumbing and Drainage Works.
- 4.3 The development must be provided with an on-site water supply system. Adequate domestic and firefighting protection must be provided to the development, and must be certified by an hydraulic engineer or other suitably qualified person.
- 4.4 On-site sewerage treatment and disposal must be provided in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), *Queensland Plumbing and Wastewater Code* and Council's Plumbing and Drainage Policies.
- 4.5 The on-site sewerage treatment and disposal area must not be located within the existing water course, overland flow path or conflict with the separation distance as detailed with the *Queensland Plumbing and Wastewater Code*.
- 4.6 Structures must not be located within the on-site sewerage treatment and disposal area or conflict with the separation distances, in accordance with the Queensland Plumbing and Wastewater Code.

5.0 STORMWATER WORKS

5.1 All stormwater must drain to a demonstrated lawful point of discharge and must not adversely affect surrounding land or infrastructure in comparison to the pre-development conditions, including but not limited to blocking, altering or diverting existing stormwater runoff patterns or having the potential to cause damage to other infrastructure.

6.0 ROOF AND ALLOTMENT DRAINAGE WORKS

6.1 All roof and allotment runoff from the development must be directed to a lawful point of discharge and must not restrict, impair or change the natural flow of runoff water or cause a nuisance to surrounding land or infrastructure.

7.0 SITE WORKS

- 7.1 Site works must be constructed such that they do not, at any time, in any way restrict, impair or change the natural flow of runoff water, or cause a nuisance or worsening to surrounding land or infrastructure.
- 7.2 All earthworks must be undertaken in accordance with Australian Standard AS3798 "Guidelines on earthworks for commercial and residential developments".

8.0 BUILDING WORKS

8.1 A Development Permit for Building Works assessable under the Building Assessment Provisions must be obtained prior to the commencement of any building works on the site.

9.0 <u>ELECTRICITY</u>

- 9.1 Electricity services must be provided to the development in accordance with the standards and requirements of the relevant service provider.
- 9.2 Alternatively, the approved development must be provided with an on-site energy supply installed in accordance with all laws and regulations and current best practice. The installation and maintenance of the on-site energy supply is to be borne by the landowner.

10.0 TELECOMMUNICATIONS

- 10.1 Telecommunications services must be provided to the development in accordance with the standards and requirements of the relevant service provider.
- 10.2 Alternative telecommunication services (satellite) will be provided to each lot by the developer and at the cost of the developer, in accordance with the standards and requirements of the relevant service provider.

11.0 ASSET MANAGEMENT

- 11.1 Any alteration necessary to electricity, telephone, water mains, sewerage mains, and/or public utility installations resulting from the development or in connection with the development, must be undertaken and completed at no cost to Council.
- 11.2 Any damage to existing stormwater, water supply and sewerage infrastructure, kerb and channel, pathway or roadway (including removal of concrete slurry from public land and Council infrastructure), that occurs while any works are being carried out in association with this development approval must be repaired at full cost to the developer. This includes the reinstatement of any existing traffic signs or pavement markings that may have been removed or damaged.

12.0 OPERATING PROCEDURES

12.1 All construction materials, waste, waste skips, machinery and contractors' vehicles must be located and stored or parked within the development site. Storage of materials or parking of construction machinery or contractors' vehicles must not occur within Griffith Street.

ADVISORY NOTES

NOTE 1. Aboriginal Cultural Heritage

It is advised that under section 23 of the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2003*, a person who carries out an activity must take all reasonable and practicable measures to ensure the activity does not harm Aboriginal cultural heritage (the "cultural heritage duty of care"). Maximum penalties for breaching the duty of care are listed in the Aboriginal cultural heritage legislation. The information on Aboriginal cultural heritage is available on the Department of Women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships and website https://www.tatsipca.qld.gov.au.

NOTE 2. General Environmental Duty

General environmental duty under the *Environmental Protection Act 1994* prohibits unlawful environmental nuisance caused by noise, aerosols, particles, dust, ash, fumes, light, odour or smoke beyond the boundaries of the development site during all stages of the development including earthworks, construction and operation.

NOTE 3. General Safety Of Public During Construction

The Work Health and Safety Act 2011 and Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices must be complied with in carrying out any construction works, and to ensure safe traffic control and safe public access in respect of works being constructed on a road.

NOTE 4. Rating Category

Please note, a Material Change of Use approval may result in an adjustment to a property's rating category. Please contact Council's Rates Department should you require further information.

NOTE 5. Infrastructure Charges Notice

Council has resolved not to issue an Infrastructure Charges Notice for this development because the new infrastructure charges arising from the development are less than or equal to the credits applicable for the new development.

NOTE 6. Noise and Odour

The lot the subject of this development approval is located within a Special Management Area. This area is expressly identified as being impacted by lawful non-residential uses. In commencing a residential use within the area, the owner(s) acknowledges and accepts that the use will be potentially impacted by emissions from the lawful non-residential uses.

It is the responsibility of the property owner(s) to take all measures necessary to ensure that the proposed dwelling is developed and maintained in such a way as to mitigate odour and noise impacts from the surrounding lawful non-residential uses. These measures must be undertaken at the expense of the property owner(s).

NOTE 7. Flood Investigation Area

The development site is affected by Floodplain Investigation Overlay Mapping. This development site may be affected by the one percent (1%) AEP Fitzroy River and/or Local

Storm / Overland Flow flooding event. However, Council has no Fitzroy River and/or Local Storm / Overland Flow flood information available for the subject lot as it is outside the extents of the current flood study and modelling undertaken by Council.

The finished floor level for habitable areas must be a minimum of 500 millimetres above the one percent (1%) Annual Exceedance Probability flood inundation level. A suitably qualified and experienced person must determine the one percent (1%) Annual Exceedance Probability flood inundation level.

The one percent (1%) Annual exceedance probability (AEP) flood extents for the development site may be obtained from Department of Natural Resources and Mines, Manufacturing, and Regional and Rural Development. Where the development site is located within the inundation extents consideration must be given to flood risk for the development and how this risk can be mitigated to an acceptable level for the use proposed.



Attachment 2 - Appeal Rights

PLANNING ACT 2016

The following is an extract from the *Planning Act* 2016 (*Chapter 6*)

Appeal rights

229 Appeals to tribunal or P&E Court

- (1) Schedule 1 states-
 - (a) matters that may be appealed to—(i)either a tribunal or the P&E Court; or(ii)only a tribunal; or
 - (iii) only the P&E Court; and
 - (b) the person—
 - (i) who may appeal a matter (the appellant); and
 - (ii) who is a respondent in an appeal of the matter; and
 - (iii) who is a co-respondent in an appeal of the matter; and
 - (iv)who may elect to be a co-respondent in an appeal of the matter.
- (2) An appellant may start an appeal within the appeal period.
- (3) The appeal period is-
 - (a) for an appeal by a building advisory agency—10 business days after a decision notice for the decision is given to the agency or
 - (b) for an appeal against a deemed refusal—at any time after the deemed refusal happens; or
 - (c) for an appeal against a decision of the Minister, under chapter 7, part 4, to register premises or to renew the registration of premises—20 business days after a notice is published under section 269(3)(a) or (4); or
 - (d) for an appeal against an infrastructure charges notice— 20 business days after the infrastructure charges notice is given to the person; or
 - (e) for an appeal about a deemed approval of a development application for which a decision notice has not been given—30 business days after the applicant gives the deemed approval notice to the assessment manager; or
 - (f) for any other appeal—20 business days after a notice of the decision for the matter, including an enforcement notice, is given to the person.

Note-

See the P&E Court Act for the court's power to extend the appeal period.

- (4) Each respondent and co-respondent for an appeal may be heard in the appeal.
- (5) If an appeal is only about a referral agency's response, the assessment manager may apply to the tribunal or P&E Court to withdraw from the appeal.
- (6) To remove any doubt, it is declared that an appeal against an infrastructure charges notice must not be about—
 - (a) the adopted charge itself; or
 - (b) for a decision about an offset or refund—
 - (i) the establishment cost of trunk infrastructure identified in a LGIP; or
 - (ii) the cost of infrastructure decided using the method included in the local government's charges resolution.

230 Notice of appeal

- (1) An appellant starts an appeal by lodging, with the registrar of the tribunal or P&E Court, a notice of appeal that— (a) is in the approved form; and
 - (b) succinctly states the grounds of the appeal.
- (2) The notice of appeal must be accompanied by the required fee.
- (3) The appellant or, for an appeal to a tribunal, the registrar must, within the service period, give a copy of the notice of appeal to—

- (a) the respondent for the appeal; and
- (b) each co-respondent for the appeal; and
- (c) for an appeal about a development application under schedule 1, table 1, item 1—each principal submitter for the development application; and
- (d) for an appeal about a change application under schedule 1, table 1, item 2—each principal submitter for the change application; and
- (e) each person who may elect to become a co-respondent for the appeal, other than an eligible submitter who is not a principal submitter in an appeal under paragraph
 (c) or (d); and
- (f) for an appeal to the P&E Court—the chief executive; and
- (g) for an appeal to a tribunal under another Act—any other person who the registrar considers appropriate.

(4) The service period is-

- (a) if a submitter or advice agency started the appeal in the P&E Court—2 business days after the appeal is started; or
- (b) otherwise—10 business days after the appeal is started.
- (5) A notice of appeal given to a person who may elect to be a co-respondent must state the effect of subsection
- (6) A person elects to be a co-respondent by filing a notice of election, in the approved form, within 10 business days after the notice of appeal is given to the person.

231 Other appeals

- (1) Subject to this chapter, schedule 1 and the P&E Court Act, unless the Supreme Court decides a decision or other matter under this Act is affected by jurisdictional error, the decision or matter is non-appealable.
- (2) The Judicial Review Act 1991, part 5 applies to the decision or matter to the extent it is affected by jurisdictional error.
- (3) A person who, but for subsection (1) could have made an application under the Judicial Review Act 1991 in relation to the decision or matter, may apply under part 4 of that Act for a statement of reasons in relation to the decision or matter.
- (4) In this section— decision includes—
 - (a) conduct engaged in for the purpose of making a decision; and
 - (b) other conduct that relates to the making of a decision; and
 - (c) the making of a decision or the failure to make a decision; and
 - (d) a purported decision; and
 - (e) a deemed refusal.
- **non-appealable**, for a decision or matter, means the decision or matter—
 - (a) is final and conclusive; and
 - (b) may not be challenged, appealed against, reviewed, quashed, set aside or called into question in any other way under the Judicial Review Act 1991 or otherwise, whether by the Supreme Court, another court, a tribunal or another entity; and
 - (c) is not subject to any declaratory, injunctive or other order of the Supreme Court, another court, a tribunal or another entity on any ground.

232 Rules of the P&E Court

- (1) A person who is appealing to the P&E Court must comply with the rules of the court that apply to the appeal.
- (2) However, the P&E Court may hear and decide an appeal even if the person has not complied with rules of the P&E Court.

Schedule 1

Appeals section 229

- 1 Appeal rights and parties to appeals
- (1) Table 1 states the matters that may be appealed to—(a) the P&E court; or (b) a tribunal.
- (2) However, table 1 applies to a tribunal only if the matter involves—
 - (a) the refusal, or deemed refusal of a development application, for-
 - (i) a material change of use for a classified building; or
 - (ii) operational work associated with building work, a retaining wall, or a tennis court; or
 - (b) a provision of a development approval for-
 - (i) a material change of use for a classified building; or
- (ii) operational work associated with building work, a retaining wall, or a tennis court; or
 - (c) if a development permit was applied for—the decision to give a preliminary approval for—
 - (i) a material change of use for a classified building; or
 - (ii) operational work associated with building work, a retaining wall, or a tennis court; or
 - (d) a development condition if-
 - (i) the development approval is only for a material change of use that involves the use of a building classified under the Building Code as a class 2 building; and
 - (ii) the building is, or is proposed to be, not more than 3 storeys; and
 - (iii) the proposed development is for not more than 60 sole-occupancy units; or
 - (e) a decision for, or a deemed refusal of, an extension application for a development approval that is only for a material change of use of a classified building; or
 - (f) a decision for, or a deemed refusal of, a change application for a development approval that is only for a material change of use of a classified building; or
 - (g) a matter under this Act, to the extent the matter relates to-
 - (i) the Building Act, other than a matter under that Act that may or must be decided by the Queensland Building and Construction Commission; or
 - (ii) the Plumbing and Drainage Act, part 4 or 5; or
 - (h) a decision to give an enforcement notice in relation to a matter under paragraphs (a) to (g); or
 - (i) a decision to give an infrastructure charges notice; or
 - (j) the refusal, or deemed refusal, of a conversion application; or
 - (k) a matter that, under another Act, may be appealed to the tribunal; or
 - (I) a matter prescribed by regulation.
- (3) Also, table 1 does not apply to a tribunal if the matter involves—
 - (a) for a matter in subsection (2)(a) to (d)—
 - (i) a development approval for which the development application required impact assessment; and
 - (ii) a development approval in relation to which the assessment manager received a properly made submission for the development application; or
 - (b) a provision of a development approval about the identification or inclusion, under a variation approval, of a matter for the development.
- (4) Table 2 states the matters that may be appealed only to the P&E Court.
- (5) Table 3 states the matters that may be appealed only to the tribunal.
- (6) In each table—
 - (a) column 1 states the appellant in the appeal; and
 - (b) column 2 states the respondent in the appeal; and
