8.1 FLYING FOX STATEMENT OF MANAGEMENT INTENT

SUMMARY

The Manager Health and Environment is seeking Council's direction regarding a Flying-fox Statement of Management Intent for the Rockhampton Region

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council adopt the Flying-Fox Statement of Management Intent.

COMMENTARY

In November 2013, the Queensland Government introduced a new approach to Flying-Fox roost management that empowers local governments to make decisions about how to best manage individual flying-fox roosts in urban areas and authorises them to act on these decisions without the need for a permit under the *Nature Conservation Act 1992*.

Essentially Local Governments are now authorised as-of-right to manage, including disperse, flying-fox roosts in defined urban areas – referred to as urban flying-fox management areas (UFFMA) – with the as-of-right management activities limited to non-lethal methods taken in accordance with a Code of Practice – Ecologically Sustainable Management of Flying-Fox Roosts.

Local Governments wishing to conduct non-code compliant activities within a UFFMA or manage a roost outside of the UFFMA are required to obtain a Flying-Fox Roost Management Permit (FFRMP) from the Department of Environment and Heritage Protection. Individual property owners inside or outside a UFFMA must apply for a permit (FFRMP).

Legislation will be introduced to allow the Minister for Environment and Heritage Protection to require a local government to prepare a Statement of Management Intent (SoMI) for roost management in its UFFMA.

A SoMI enables a local government to declare to its community its management intent for both existing and new roosts in their UFFMA. It may also include details of factors that Council would consider before deciding whether to take any action at a particular site, details of additional factors that Council would consider in deciding the most appropriate action to take at particular sites and details of further factors that Council would consider, where Council decides, for particular sites, that the most appropriate action is dispersal. No approval by the department is currently required for these statements.

A SoMI has been drafted, as attached, which outlines Council's intention and considerations on how it will manage flying fox roosts within and outside the UFFMA.

The intent in the SoMI is that Council will co-ordinate the management of flying fox roosts on Council owned or State land placed under the control of Council pursuant to the *Land Act 1994* within and outside the UFFMA. Costs relating to the management of the flying fox roost will be negotiated prior to the application for or implementation of any permit or action.

Where a flying fox roost is on Council owned or State land placed under the control of Council pursuant to the *Land Act 1994* and either State land(s) or private land(s), Council will work with the relevant landholder to manage the flying fox roost. Costs relating to the management of the flying fox roost will be the responsibility of both Council and the relevant

landholder and will be negotiated prior to the application for or implementation of any permit or action.

Council's intent is to have no involvement in the management of flying fox roosts solely on State land(s) or private land(s) or a combination of the two.

If residents are dissatisfied with Council's approach at a particular roost site, they may apply for a permit directly from Department of Environment and Heritage Protection.

PREVIOUS DECISIONS

In August 2013 Council submitted an application for a Damage Mitigation Permit (now known as a Flying Fox Roost Management Permit) associated with a flying fox roost in proximity of the Westwood Community Hall, Westwood. This permit became void with the changes in the legislation in late 2013 as the roost is within a UFFMA.

In February 2014 Council resolved to facilitate the administrative co-ordination of a FFRMP in the Kabra locality only if the following conditions are agreed prior to the lodgement of that permit:

- (1) Full cost recovery for all aspects other than administrative co-ordination of the FFRMP
- (2) State government contribution towards the application for and implementation of the FFRMP commensurate with the density of the roost population and area of the roost on the unallocated state government.
- (3) Consensus between impacted private landholders to contribute towards the application for and implementation of the FFRMP commensurate with the density of the roost population and area of the roost on private land.
- (4) Acceptance by the impacted parties that post-dispersal migration may result in further costs should the roost re-locate within UFFMA or non-UFFMA whereby complaint arises.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The exact costs associated with flying fox roosts and associated dispersal activity is unknown and is dependent on the option adopted for each roost. Preliminary cost estimates for dispersal activities of the Kabra flying-fox roost were up to \$160,000.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Post-dispersal measures may result in additional expense being incurred by Council should Council enter into the initial activity.

STAFFING IMPLICATIONS

Range from no staff to 1 EHO project manager and on ground staff required for dispersal actions.

RISK ASSESSMENT

Risk ranges from no risk to high risk dependent on which management operation is adopted for each roost.

CORPORATE/OPERATIONAL PLAN

Corporate Plan Outcome – A healthy and liveable environment for everyone to enjoy

Operation Plan - Provide regulatory and compliance services in line with statutory requirements and best practice.

CONCLUSION

A SoMI has been drafted to enable Council to declare to the community Council's management intent for both existing and new roosts within and outside Council's UFFMA's.

Council will co-ordinate the management of flying fox roosts on Council owned or State land placed under the control of Council pursuant to the *Land Act 1994* within and outside the UFFMA. Costs relating to the management of the flying fox roost will be negotiated prior to the application for or implementation of any permit or action.

Where a flying fox roost is on Council owned or State land placed under the control of Council pursuant to the *Land Act 1994* and either State land(s) or private land(s), Council will work with the relevant landholder to manage the flying fox roost. 1. Authority

Under the *Nature Conservation Act 1992*, local governments in Queensland have an as-of-right authority to undertake roost management at flying-fox roosts in designated Urban Flying-Fox Management Areas (UFFMAs). An UFFMA for a local government area is defined by maps available from the website of the Department of Environment and Heritage Protection (EHP).

Outside an UFFMA, a local government requires a Flying-fox roost management permit (FFRMP), available from EHP. A non-council applicant requires a FFRMP irrespective of the location of the roost.

2. Purpose

The purpose of this SoMI is to articulate the approach that Rockhampton Regional Council will take to the management of flying-fox roosts in the Rockhampton Region.

3. Location of the UFFMA in Rockhampton Regional Council

4. Council intentions and considerations

Council will co-ordinate the management of flying fox roosts on Council owned or State land placed under the control of Council pursuant to the *Land Act 1994* within and outside the UFFMA. Costs relating to the management of the flying fox roost will be negotiated prior to the application for or implementation of any permit or action.

Where a flying fox roost is on Council owned or State land placed under the control of Council pursuant to the *Land Act 1994* and either State land(s) or private land(s), Council will work with the relevant landholder to manage the flying fox roost. Costs relating to the management of the flying fox roost will be the responsibility of both Council and the relevant landholder and will be negotiated prior to the application for or implementation of any permit or action.

Council's intent is to have no involvement in the management of flying fox roosts solely on State land(s) or private land(s) or a combination of the two.

Factors that Council will consider before deciding whether to take any action at particular sites, includes:

- The wellbeing impacts and concerns that nearby residents are experiencing
- Whether Council considers that there are any risks to human health or wellbeing from the roost
- Whether the roost is on Council land and State land(s) or private land(s), and if State land(s) or private land(s), whether consent for Council to undertake management has been provided by all relevant landholders, and full cost recovery, proportionate to the land, has been agreed to.

Additional factors that Council will consider in deciding the most appropriate action to take at particular sites, includes:

- The cost of various management actions; and who would contribute to these costs
- The number of each species of flying-foxes at the roost, and what Council's intention would be should the flying-foxes be breeding or rearing their young
- Whether good outcomes may be achieved with minimal management interventions (such as community education) or moderate management interventions such as 'nudging' or 'buffering', processes by which the impact of an existing roost may be managed by its reduction.

Further factors that Council will consider, where Council decides, for particular sites, that the most appropriate action is dispersal, includes:

- The number of years that flying-foxes have used a particular roost site
- The likelihood of flying-foxes relocating to a site of greater conflict with the community
- Whether flying-foxes at the site are capable of independent flight at the time of year proposed for driving them away
- Whether a proposed management action may cause harm to flying-foxes.

If residents are dissatisfied with Council's approach at a particular roost site, they may apply for a permit directly from EHP.

If a roost is on private land(s), low impact activities may be undertaken by a person as-of-right under the relevant code of practice. The *Code of practice – Low impact activities affecting flying-fox roost*.

Council's roost management actions will be undertaken in compliance with the *Code of Practice – Ecologically sustainable management of flying-fox roosts*.

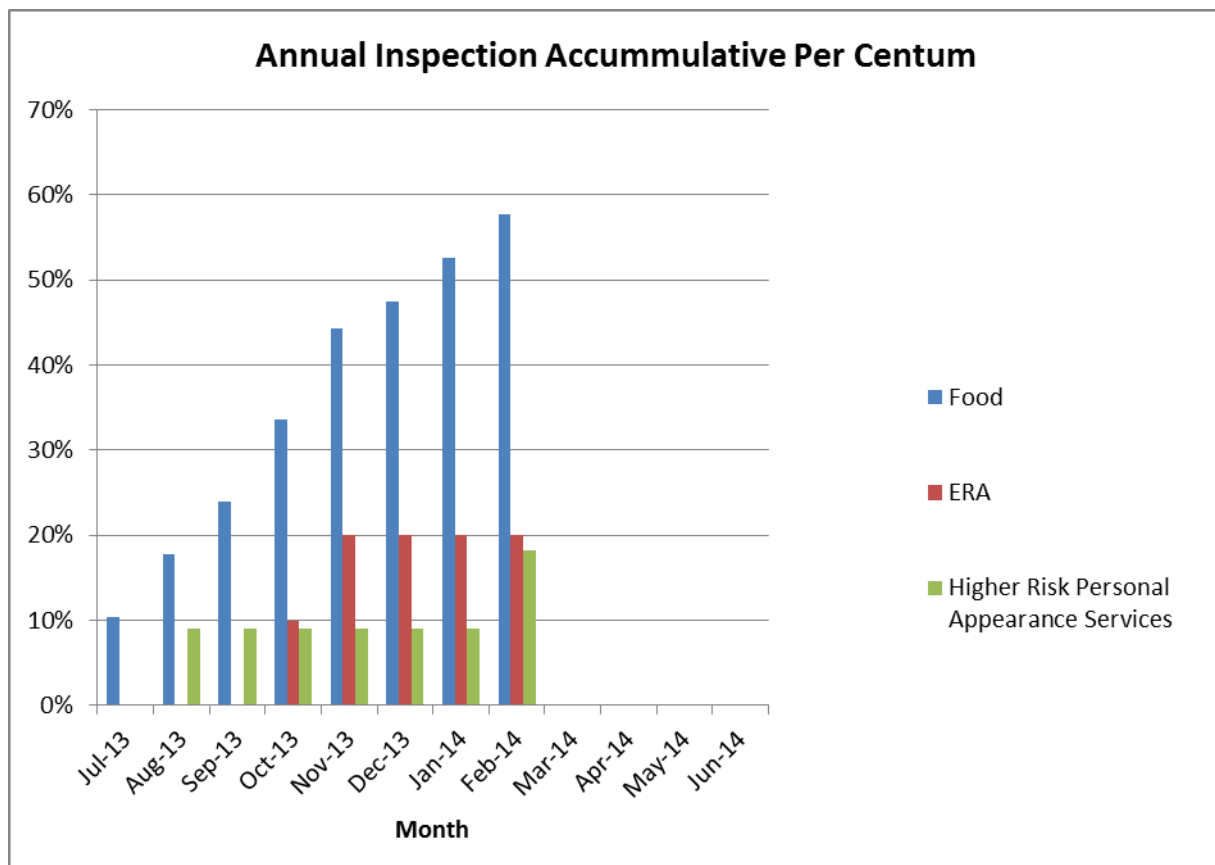
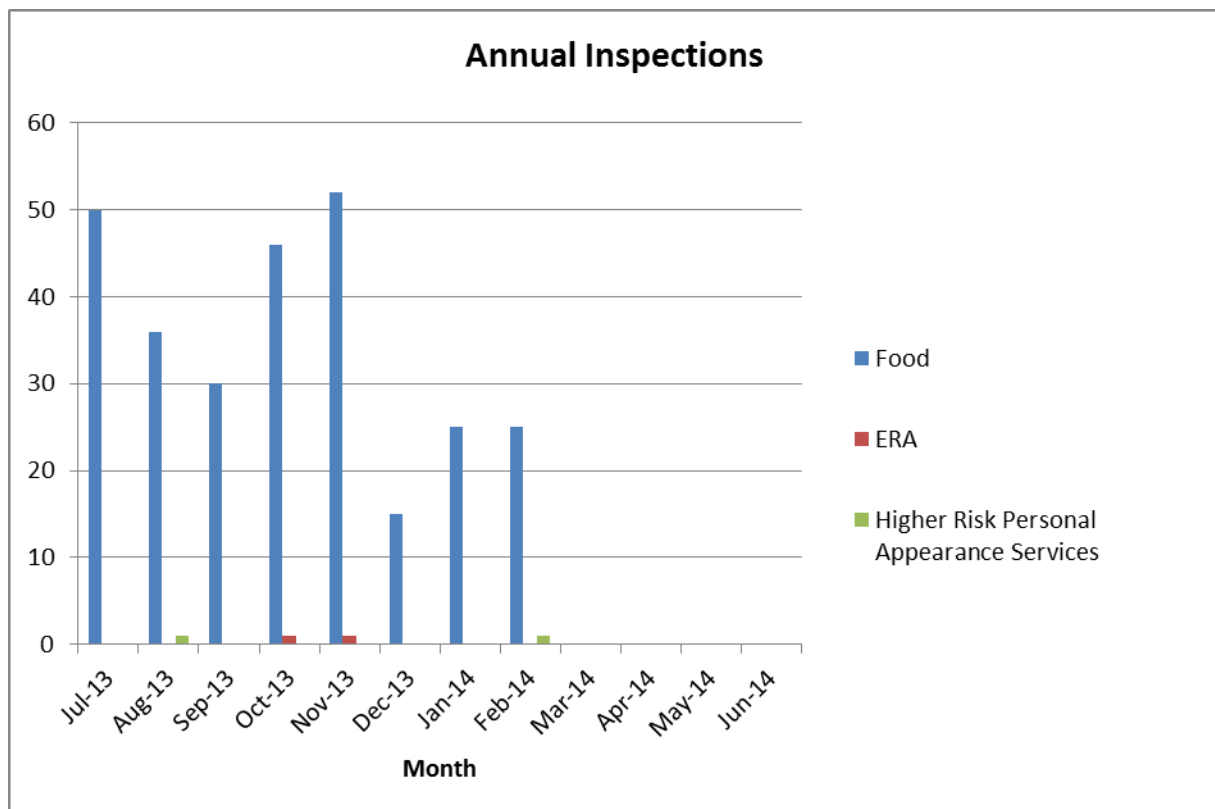

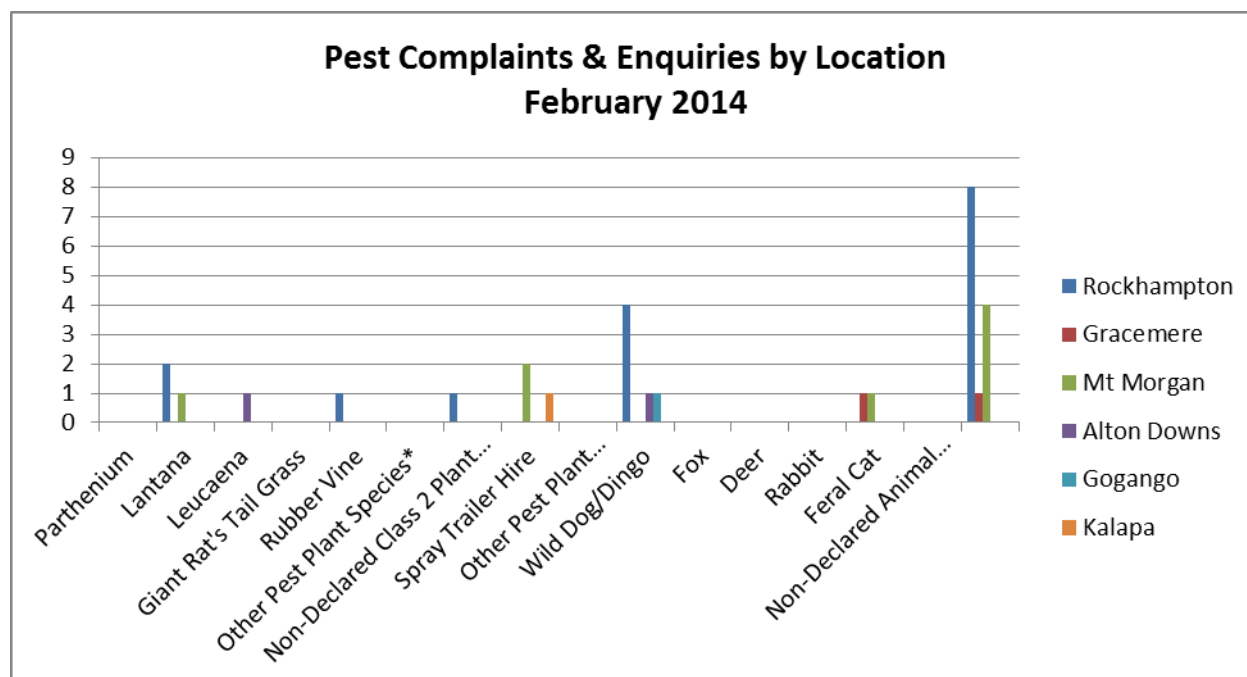

VECTOR MANAGEMENT

The following is a summary of the activities of the Pest Management Unit for the month of February 2014.

Surveillance of Fitzroy River: Scheduled surveillance was undertaken one occasion with a total of ten sites sampled. Mosquito breeding above the threshold was found on eight sites initiating treatment of these sites with a total of 131 hectares being treated. Post-treatment sampling indicated a 98.5 per centum larva mortality rate.

Surveillance of Urban Saltmarsh: Scheduled surveillance was undertaken on one site. Mosquito breeding found on the site was below the threshold resulting in no treatment being undertaken.

Surveillance of Freshwater Areas: Surveillance of thirteen freshwater sites was undertaken. Above-threshold mosquito breeding was found in one site, which were treated. Post-treatment sampling indicated a 99 per centum larva mortality rate.

Property Inspections: Property inspections for dengue management were undertaken on thirteen properties. The inspections found nine properties breeding mosquitoes three of which produced *Aedes Aegypti* the dengue fever mosquito. In each case the source of breeding was removed or treated to achieve control.

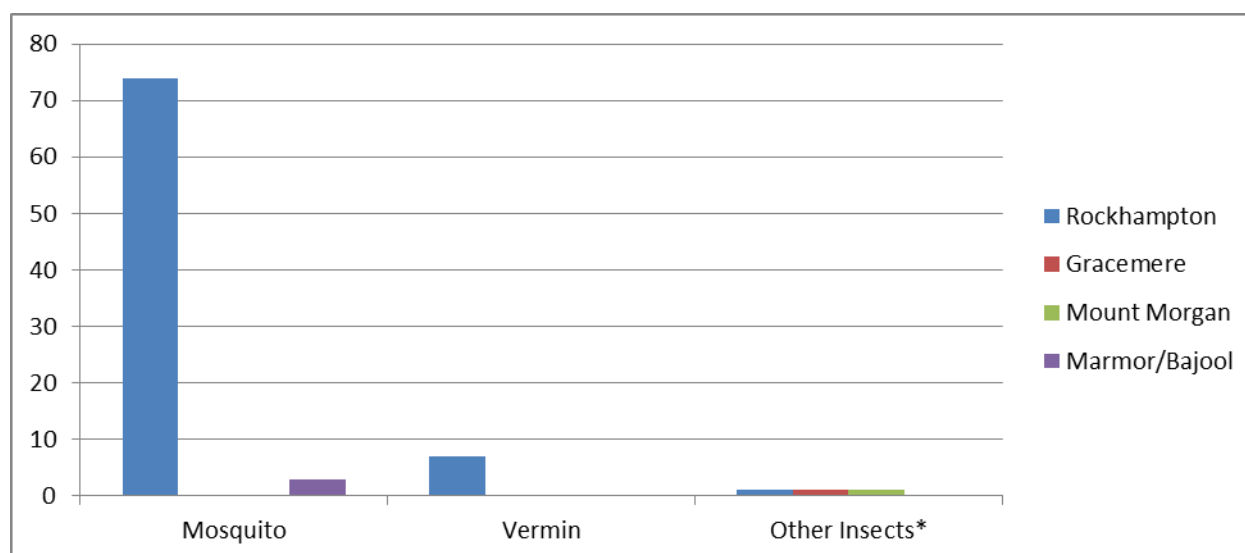

SUMMARY

The Local Laws Monthly Statistics for February 2014 is submitted for consideration of the Health and Compliance Committee.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Local Laws Monthly Statistics for February 2014 be received.

COMMENTARY

February's statistics show a reduction in animals rescued from the Pound. This is due to an increase of the Parvovirus in the community and is common for this time of year. As the majority of animals impounded are found wandering in the community, foster carer's are apprehensive about taking dogs into their care. Our rescue statistics have dropped from 16.16% in January to 5.65% in February therefore increasing the Euthanasia rate from 18.18 in January to 37.10% in February (attached).

Pound staff are taking every precaution to prevent the virus from spreading if it enters the facility. As the incubation period for the virus is four to five days and the animals are only in Council care for 72 hours is it often unknown if an animal has the virus whilst in the pound facility if they aren't showing symptoms.

Local Laws are working with Marketing and Engagement to develop strategies to educate the public on the importance of vaccinating their pets and Pound Staff are encouraging owners who collect their dogs from the pound to have their pets vet checked.

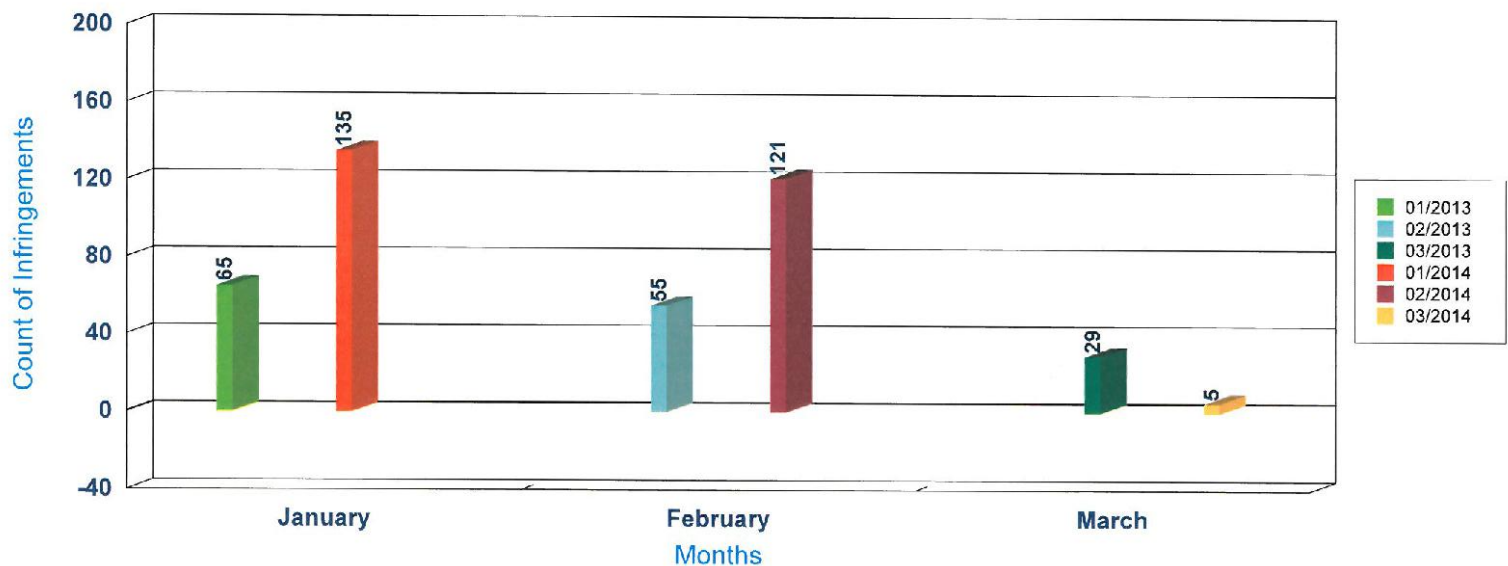

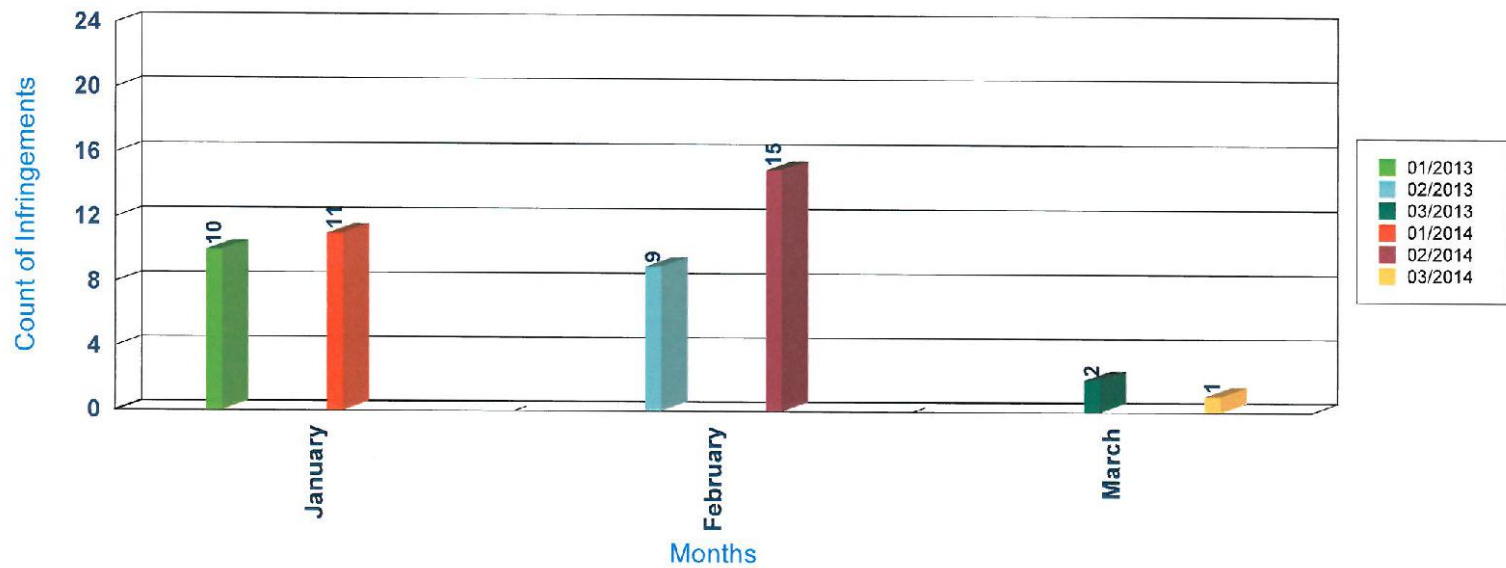


Animal Infringements Comparison Year to Date February 2014



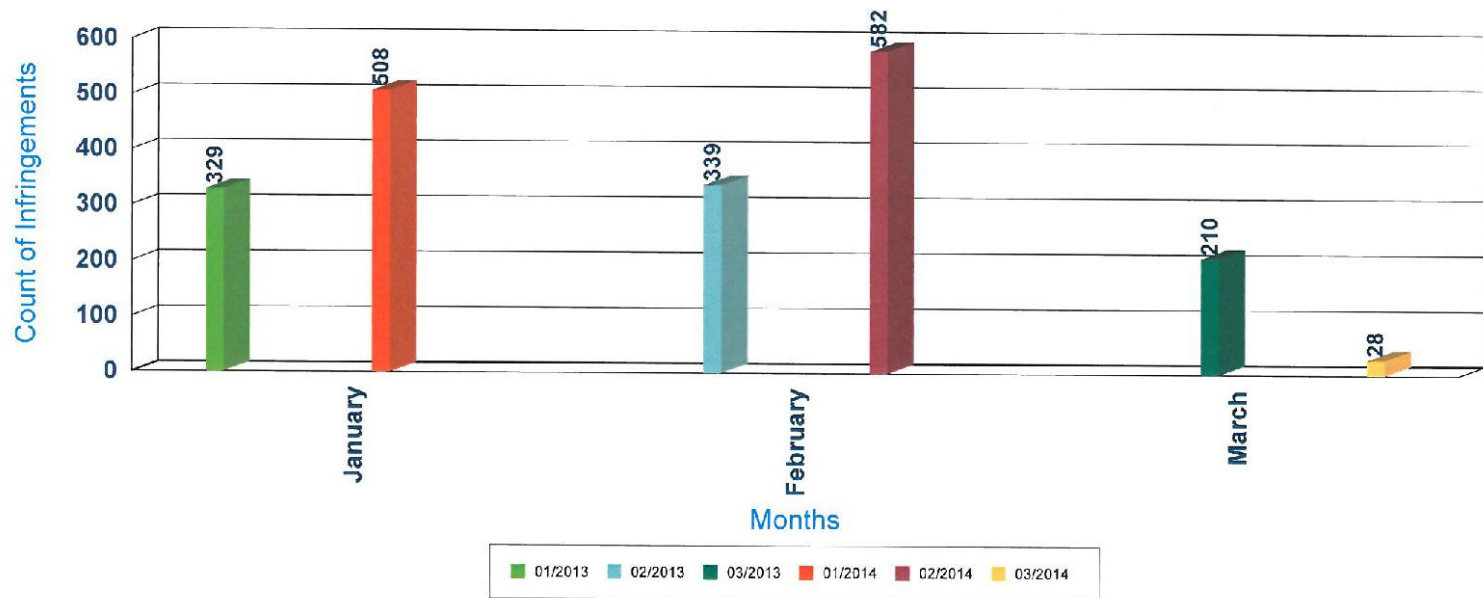


Local Law Infringements Comparison Year to Date February 2014



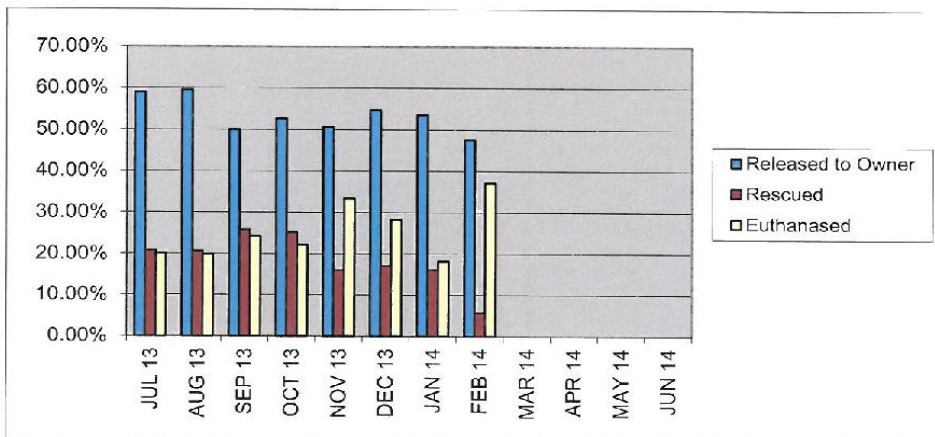


Parking Infringements Comparison Year to Date February 2014
