SUMMARY

Council has previously resolved (April 2014) that "a Development Plan for Gracemere Cemetery be progressed to facilitate use as an earth dug grave cemetery". Concept Plans, including staging for development, have been prepared and are now presented for consideration by Council. The concept plans were presented to the Parks and Recreation Committee meeting on 7 April 2015 and layed on the table. The impediment to further consideration of the concepts and resolution has been dealt with, and the report is now presented for consideration by Council.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT the report be received and the Chief Executive Officer be authorised to progress the conversion of SP163921/2 from Reserve for Park to Reserve for Cemetery.

COMMENTARY

The attached plans provide a concept for the future development of the Gracemere Cemetery and include staging options to allow for sequential development. Proposed Stage One maintains the primary access from Bland St (as does stage two) and includes provision for the construction of an amenities block along with the establishment of an embellished garden area to be used for the interment of ashes. Other landscaping elements include an attractive entry statement planting and renewal (over time) of the existing trees and shrubs to introduce a consistent theme for future stages. A detailed landscape plan has not yet been developed.

The existing timber fence will be removed to open vistas across the site and some of the stage two planting will be undertaken to establish the footprint and to offer the amenity advantage of some advanced trees when the stage two area is developed.

The footprint for Stage One (and a significant portion of Stage Two) are contained within the boundaries of the existing Cemetery reserve.

If development proceeds in line with the concept plan the expected yield is around 3,500 additional sites.

BACKGROUND

The Regional Cemeteries – Capacity Assessment report presented to the Parks & Recreation Committee on 1 April 2014 provided an overview of current utilisation at each cemetery along with an assessment of future capacity. Following consideration of the 2014 report, Council resolved that "a Development Plan for Gracemere Cemetery be progressed to facilitate use as an earth dug grave cemetery".

An *Invitation to Quote* process was conducted and U Plan Landscape Architects were selected to develop a concept plan.

The original report titled 'Concept Plan for the Development of Gracemere Cemetery' was presented to Parks and Recreation Committee on 7 April 2015, and layed on the table in order for Council to finalise the rescission of a 2011 resolution to lease part of the Reserve to the Gracemere Redbacks Football Club. This rescission motion was approved at the Council meeting on 12 May 2015.

Attachment 3 is an extract from the Queensland Government Gazette of 12 February 1898, listing the gazettal of the Cemetery Reserve and the appointment of Trustees.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

Detailed cost estimates have not yet been prepared. An extract from the Parks capital budget relating to Cemeteries is included in the following table:

SUMMARY

Nerimbera Football Club's clubhouse sustained significant damage during Tropical Cyclone Marcia, resulting in its demolition. The Club is in the process of finalising building plans for its new clubhouse, however, requires an increase in the Leased area to accommodate the new building footprint.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT:

- Council accede to the request to Lease the whole of Lot 3 RP611713 to Nerimbera Football Club for the purposes of activities associated with the operation of the Club; and
- 2. Council cover the costs of surrender and registration of the new Freehold Lease Agreement totalling \$325.80 from Sport and Recreation Operational Budget

COMMENTARY

Nerimbera Football Club (the Club) is based at Pilbeam Park, Fargher Street, Koongal and holds a valid Freehold Licence over the playing field (being part Lot 2 RP608191 and part Lot 2 RP605755) and a valid Freehold Lease over part of Lot 3 RP611713.

The Club's Freehold Lease and Licence expire on 30 June 2015. The Lease renewal and registration process was completed in March 2015 and the Freehold Lease has a new expiry date of 30 June 2020.

There are no other formal users of the site.

BACKGROUND

The Club's clubhouse sustained significant damage during Tropical Cyclone Marcia, resulting in its demolition. The Club is in the process of finalising building plans for a new clubhouse, which will have a larger footprint resulting in the need for an increase in its Leased area.

The Club's Freehold Lease is currently divided into two (2) sections being Lease A and Lease B, to remove the need for a third section (Lease C) Council Officers are proposing that the Cub be leased the whole of Lot 3 RP611713.

The increase in Lease area will encompass the Club's proposed building as well as the existing grandstand and change rooms.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The Club's Freehold Lease Agreement will need to be surrendered and a new Freehold Lease Agreement issued to the Club for execution and subsequent registration.

There is a fee for both surrendering and registering an Agreement, being \$162.90 per document. The total cost for these actions is \$325.80.

8.4 REQUEST FROM THE 42ND AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BATTALION ASSOCIATION (ROCKHAMPTON) TO ERECT A CAIRN AND MEMORIAL PLAQUE AT SIR RAYMOND HUISH DRIVE

SUMMARY

The 42nd Australian Infantry Battalion Association has made a request to Council to install a small cairn and plaque on Sir Raymond Huish Drive in recognition of the unit's service in the First and Second World Wars and its long affiliation with Rockhampton and Central Queensland.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT the 42nd Australian Infantry Battalion Association (Rockhampton) be granted permission to erect a cairn and memorial plaque at Sir Raymond Huish Drive, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The cairn and plaque are erected in the position designated by Council;
- 2. The cairn and plaque are installed and maintained at no cost to Council. This includes the cost of any future repair work and the cost of relocating the cairn to another site should this need arise; and
- 3. The cairn and plaque are installed in accordance with all applicable Australian Standards/Codes of Practice by suitably qualified, licensed tradespersons who hold public liability insurance for performing such work.

COMMENTARY

The 42nd Australian Infantry Battalion Association was founded in 1946. Its membership is comprised of former serving members of the 42nd Battalion prior to its amalgamation with the 31st Battalion in 2008. The Association is seeking Council's permission to erect a cairn and memorial plaque on Sir Raymond Huish Drive in order to recognise the Unit's service in the First and Second World Wars and its long affiliation with the communities of Rockhampton and Central Queensland.


BACKGROUND

The 42nd Battalion was raised in Brisbane in 1915 and saw service on the European Western Front from 1916 until it was disbanded in 1918. The battalion was re-raised in Central Queensland as a Citizens Militia Unit in 1921. During the Second World War the battalion saw extensive service in the liberation of Papua New Guinea and Bougainville from 1943 until it was disbanded in 1946. In 1948 the battalion was re-raised as a Citizens Military Force in Central Queensland. In 1957 the battalion's headquarters were established in Rockhampton. In 1980 the battalion became the 42nd Battalion, The Royal Queensland Regiment as part of the Active Australian Army Reserve. In 2008 it was amalgamated with the 31st Battalion to become the 31st/42nd Battalion, The Royal Queensland Regiment.

Council Parks Officers have discussed proposed siting, finish and specifications with the Association. Agreement was reached that in view of the proximity of the John Leak VC Memorial, the cairn and plaque should be erected 30 metres upstream from the John Leak VC Memorial on an open grassed area.

The distance between this proposed site and the John Leak VC Memorial is so there can be no confusion as to the purpose of either memorial or any suggestion that the historical circumstances of the two are related in some way, (refer to aerial in Attachment 1).

The proposed cairn will be constructed of sandstone and be of similar size, appearance and finish as those cairns surrounding the John Leak VC Memorial; in the interests of keeping uniformity in the precinct. The following specifications are proposed:



The cairn will be installed on a concrete base to stabilise it and to provide clear access for general park maintenance; and it will be constructed and installed by a qualified, licensed contractor.

The Association proposes the following in relation to the plaque:

42ND AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BATTALION

The battalion saw First World War service from 1916 to 1918 in France and Flanders as part of the 11th Brigade of the 3rd Division.

At the end of the First World War a militia unit was raised in Central Queensland to carry on the traditions of the 42nd Battalion.

During the Second World War the battalion served as a Militia unit in New Guinea and Bougainville from 1943 to 1945. The 42nd and other battalions of the 29th Brigade served continuously in New Guinea for 18 months.

The traditions of the battalion have been carried on by the 42nd Battalion, Royal Queensland Regiment, and, since amalgamation in 2008, by the 31st/42nd Battalion, Royal Queensland Regiment.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

There are no funding issues for Council arising from this proposal. The Association will be responsible for all costs associated with fabrication, installation, maintenance and removal or relocation (if required).

LEGISLATIVE CONTEXT

The land at Sir Raymond Huish Drive is a State Government Reserve administered by the Department of Natural Resources and managed by Rockhampton Regional Council as Trustee. The Department of Natural Resources has been contacted by Council regarding the proposal and has advised that it has no objection to the proposal being approved provided the current Land Management Plan (LMP) is amended to reflect the placement and the future maintenance responsibilities.

CONCLUSION

Council approval is sought for this request, such that the cairn and plaque can be fabricated and installed prior to the commemoration of the centenary of the formation of the 42nd Battalion in December 2015.

SUMMARY

As a result of damage arising from Tropical Cyclone Marcia the circle of twelve (12) Canary Islands Date Palms, which form part of the Heritage Listed Rockhampton War Memorial (Cenotaph), was severely compromised. Only five (5) palms remain standing. Officers are requesting Council support for the lodgement of a submission to the Queensland Anzac Centenary Grants Program seeking funding to undertake restoration of the Landscape to reinstate the original planting intent.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council endorse the lodgement of a submission to the Queensland Anzac Centenary Grants Program seeking funding to undertake restoration of the Landscape to reinstate the original planting intent of the Rockhampton War Memorial (Cenotaph) in accordance with Option Three (3) of this report.

COMMENTARY

On February 20 this year, destructive winds accompanying Tropical Cyclone Marcia resulted in the loss of seven (7) of the twelve (12) Canary Islands Date Palms (*Phoenix canariensis*) which form an integral part of the surrounding landscape to the Cenotaph.

Whilst the expected lifespan of Phoenix canariensis is 50–150 years, these 5 surviving palms are >90 years old and some question now remains as to their continued ability to sustain health and vigour and not present themselves as a public hazard in the wake of their exposure to cyclonic wind conditions.

Officers are requesting Council support for the lodgement of a submission to the Queensland Anzac Centenary Grants Program seeking funding to undertake restoration of the Landscape to reinstate the original planting intent *i.e.* a circle of twelve (12) palms.

Grants of up to \$50,000 are available under the project category *Memorials and Honour Boards*. Applications for funding under Round 3 of the Queensland Anzac Centenary Grants close at 4.00 pm on Tuesday 9 June, 2015. All funded work are to be complete by December 2016.

BACKGROUND

The Rockhampton War Memorial was designed by Rockhampton architectural firm Hockings and Palmer. Built in 1923 by Rockhampton monumental mason F.M. Allen, it was unveiled by Queensland Governor Sir Matthew Nathan on 16 November 1924 and saw its first Anzac Day service on 25 April 1925.

The Landscape was designed by Richard Simmons (the then Curator of Rockhampton Botanic Gardens) and consists of an inner circle (hedge) surrounded by an outer circle of 12 Canary Islands Date Palms (*Phoenix canariensis*). The palms are planted equally and symmetrically apart at 30° intervals to the central spire obelisk to form what appears to be a horizontal sundial.

OPTIONS

Option One: Do nothing

This option is not consistent with the Heritage Listing of the Cenotaph and the intent of the Queensland Heritage Act, 1992. It is inevitable that the remaining palms will also fail and/or be removed at a future date/s and, once all are gone, the original planting intent will be lost to the community and future generations.

Option Two: Replace only the fallen palms

A: Advanced Stock (>5m)

On a number of occasions over the past 12 months or so Council Officers have investigated the availability locally (within RRC Parks and/or streetscapes) of mature Canariensis palms which may be suited to transplanting. In general terms, all candidate specimens of suitable size were considered to be unsuitable for translocation due to a combination of plant condition (visually unbalanced, mechanical damage from birds, infestation by symbiotic/parasitic plants), age (remaining useful lifespan) and the impact of the loss of amenity at the donor site through the removal of mature landscape elements.

Investigations for the supply of mature specimens from specialist providers revealed that very advanced specimens (>5 metres tall) were available however, as suppliers contacted were based in Southeast Queensland or Northern New South Wales acquisition and transport quickly escalated the overall cost of this option.

The use of advanced specimens (>3metres tall) will necessitate the installation and maintenance of significant bracing\propping for a period of 12-24 months after planting to allow the palms to establish a root structure sufficient to sustain and support it. The bracing\propping will introduce additional trip hazards into the area and will significantly detract from the aesthetics of the precinct whilst installed.

B: Semi-advanced Stock (~3m)

Replacement semi-advanced palms around this height will not require propping/bracing, thus presenting a lower risk profile than option two. Smaller specimens are also cheaper to purchase and transport. The downside to this approach is the lack of uniformity in height with the remaining Canariensis palms, which will most likely detract from the overall visual amenity of the area.

Option Three: Replace all palms with semi-advanced (~3m) Canariensis specimens

Along with the advantages of option two, this alternative will effectively reset the entire circle at a uniform height with palms of very similar age and condition. Supported by appropriate management and cultural practices the renewed perimeter planting will have every chance of reaching the upper range of their expected life span.

Options Four: Replace all Canariensis palms with an alternate species

As Phoenix canariensis is the choice of the original landscape designer, the use of an alternate species, although not necessarily off limits, would seem to warrant much closer investigation to ensure relevance to the design intent and acceptance by the community.

Options Five: Replace Canariensis palms with an alternate object\structure

Council may also consider whether community support would sustain an approach which replaced some or all of the palms with inanimate objects/structures. Options could include a series of sculptures which reflect upon the impacts of war or perhaps even tell the story of a local identity or community impacted by the theatre of war.

If this was to become the preferred option then an Exemption Certificate Application to Environment and Heritage Protection would be required with a demonstration of substantial community support.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

At the time of writing, an estimate of cost had not been finalised. Preliminary investigations have revealed that semi-advanced palms (~3m) can be landed in Rockhampton for around \$4,000 each (ex GST). In simple terms, the larger the specimen, the greater the cost of acquisition, transport, installation and maintenance.

The Grant would be made for \$50,000. The works described are not covered by Council's insurance, to the extent of replacing the trees (7) immediately affected by Tropical Cyclone Marcia.

Council would be expected to contribute at least 25% of the overall expense budget for the replacement works (excluding in-kind contributions, any private sponsorships received and funding received from any other programs). Draft Parks budget for 2015-16 has an allocation for restoration of the botanical collection at Rockhampton Botanic Gardens – the 25% contribution will be funded from that.

LEGISLATIVE CONTEXT

Queensland Heritage Act, 1992. The object of the Act is to provide for the conservation of Queensland's cultural heritage for the benefit of the community and future generations.

<u>Cenotaph</u>: Listed on Queensland Heritage Register as Rockhampton War Memorial (including surrounding landscape). Place ID 600818.

<u>Botanic Gardens:</u> Listed on Queensland Heritage Register (Cenotaph included as fabric of Gardens). Place ID 601819

Cenotaph: Listed on Queensland War Memorial Register (including surrounding landscape).

STAFFING IMPLICATIONS

The work to reinstate the Cenotaph landscape can be completed within Parks resourcing.

CONCLUSION

Whilst the expected lifespan of *Phoenix canariensis* is 50–150 years, the five (5) surviving palms are >90 years old and some question now remains as to their continued ability to sustain health and vigour and not present themselves as a public hazard in the wake of their exposure to cyclonic wind conditions. Simultaneous replacement of the entire planting with semi-advanced palms (not requiring propping/bracing) will present a planting of uniform appearance which is aesthetically pleasing. This would also be consistent with the object of the Queensland Heritage Act, 1992 *i.e.* "to provide for the conservation of Queensland's cultural heritage for the benefit of the community and future generations".



Kershaw Gardens

Kershaw Gardens remains closed to the public. The process of vegetation clearance and site sampling commenced on 21 April with the establishment of a compound at the Charles St entrance to control site access; this area includes a vehicle wash-down facility to facilitate decontamination of vehicles, plant & equipment operating on the site. Appropriate site management equipment/facilities and essential first aid has been installed.

Investigations are continuing to identify areas which may be suited for on-site disposal (burial) of exposed waste. Further fallen vegetation clearance is continuing under the Site Management Plan and Site Safety Plan. Sampling of soil and contaminants has commenced in priority areas (waterfall and playground areas).

Botanic Gardens

Primary efforts through March and April were focussed on continuing the vegetation removal commenced by the ADF and preparation of the Cenotaph and surrounds for the ANZAC Day Dawn Service. The Gardens re-opened to the public on Good Friday and fully re-opened (vehicle gates) on Anzac Day (following the Dawn Service).

A complete arboriculture assessment has been completed of the trees in the Gardens, with rectification works underway (pruning, monitoring, propping etc). Other restoration works to pathways, garden areas are in assessment and planning stages.

Rockhampton Zoo

Rockhampton Zoo was closed to all visitors and volunteers throughout March, re-opening to visitors on Good Friday. Clearing fallen vegetation, tending to animal welfare and minor enclosure repairs.

The otters and macaques have been introduced to each other with no unexpected problems. The first day there was lots of curiosity from both species but on the second day the two youngest macaques were intimidating the otters with the effect that the otters (for the moment) prefer to stay in the safety of their own enclosure. It is early days and the otters are bound to recover their confidence.

Minor enclosure upgrades are continuing when possible; eg new Boyd's forest dragon enclosure and larger enclosure for the juvenile fresh water crocodiles who are growing out of their current one.

Regional Cemeteries

All regional cemeteries are still being maintained as scheduled. Mt Morgan cemetery received an extra tidy up in preparation for the Golden Mount Festival.

Work is continuing on the training, data cleansing and transfer for the new Cemeteries information management system, replacing UNICem.

Tenure Renewal

Currently Council is following up on 37 outstanding tenure renewals. Of those 37:

- 46% Council requires information from the Lessee/ Licensee/ Permittee (e.g. paperwork, signed agreements etc)
- 54% Awaiting action from Council (e.g. survey plans, preparation of Agreements, review of documentation etc)

Of the 37 outstanding tenure renewals, 14 will be on hold pending Council's negotiations with Department of Natural Resources and Mines regarding Trustee Leases.
