

Councillor Conduct Register

1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024

In accordance with section 150DX of the Local Government Act 2009 (the Act), the Rockhampton Regional Council must maintain and publish a Councillor Conduct Register. Following the legislative amendment to the Local Government Act 2009 on 22 November 2023, section 150DX was updated to remove the requirement for Local Governments to record in the Councillor Conduct Register any matters dismissed by the Assessor. This register is current and includes all complaints received prior to this date and any complaints received after this date bar matters that have been dismissed by Office of the Independent Assessor.

C/23/00603	13/10/23		It is alleged a councillor voted on matter where they had a declarable conflict of interest.	25/10/23	No further action	The OIA decided to take no further action pursuant to section 150Y(b)(iii) of the Local Government Act 2009 [the Act] on the basis that taking further action would be an unjustifiable use of resources. In correspondence with council, it was acknowledged that this incident arose due to a lack of concentration rather than any intentional conduct on the councillor's part. The evidence suggested that the councillor's involvement was inadvertent. The councillor demonstrated appreciation and awareness of the existence of a potential conflict of interest as well as a commitment to rectifying the situation by addressing the incident at the earliest opportunity.
