## SUMMARY

This report seeks endorsement for the acquisition of three artworks from The Gold Award 2018 to Rockhampton Art Gallery collection under the sole provide provision.

## OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT Council accept the report.
- 2. THAT Council approve the recommendation from Rockhampton Art Gallery Philanthropy Board for the acquisition of the three (3) artworks to the Rockhampton Art Gallery collection.
- 3. THAT the Artists or their representing Gallery be approved as a sole supplier to Council in accordance with s.235(a) of the *Local Government Regulation 2012.*

## BACKGROUND

Since 2012 the Rockhampton Art Gallery has been supported by the Rockhampton Art Gallery Philanthropy Board and The Gold Trust to fund The Gold Award. The Gold Award acquisition prize is valued at \$50,000 which results in the acquisition of the winning artwork to the Rockhampton Art Gallery collection. The Friends of Rockhampton Art Gallery, Rockhampton Art Gallery Gift Fund, donors and artists have also provided support for the acquisition of 3 additional artworks from the Gold Award.

The Gold Award has contributed in the last three (3) years (2012, 2014 and 2016) twelve (12) artworks to Rockhampton Art Gallery collection, adding \$444,550 additional value to the collection.

Similar to past years, The Gold Award 2018 has resulted in the potential to acquire, by donation and Cultural Gifts Program (CGP) additional artworks. There is potential to acquire 3 artworks, each being significant to Rockhampton Art Gallery's collection as a nationally significant representation of visual arts. All artworks have been generously negotiated by the artists for a highly competitive purchase price.

## The artworks are:

Tony ALBERT, *All that glitters...,* 2018, represented by Sullivan+Strumpf Dale FRANK, *Jesse, a bar manager at Penrith*, 2018, represented by Roslyn Oxley Gallery Richard LEWER, *Confessions* 2016–2017, represented by Sullivan+Strumpf

Due to the nature of the purchase being an artwork then the Artists or their representing Gallery be approved as a sole supplier to Council in accordance with s.235(a) of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*. The artwork and artists has been identified and assessed to the Collection Management Plan 2014-2019, with supporting acquisition Papers Attached.

## **BUDGET IMPLICATIONS**

The total purchase value is:

Tony ALBERT, *All that glitters...,* 2018, \$66,000 Dale FRANK, *Jesse, a bar manager at Penrith*, 2018, \$60,000 Richard LEWER, *Confessions* 2016–2017, \$25,000

Total Purchase Value \$151,000 Total

Each artwork acquisition has been generously negotiated for a highly competitive purchase price. This negotiated price has been made possible through strong relationships with donors, artists and Galleries.

Donations are: Tony Albert \$33,000 Dale Frank \$12,000 Friends of Rockhampton Art Gallery \$9,000

Donation Total \$54,000

Therefore the cost of the acquisitions would be reduced to \$97,000. The acquisitions are proposed to be funded from the following sources:

Rockhampton Art Gallery Acquisition Fund - \$64,000.00Rockhampton Art Gallery Gift Fund- \$33,000.00

The Acquisition Fund is for acquisition of artwork to add to the Gallery's nationally significant collection, while the Gift Fund is a trust account held by Rockhampton Regional Council which is funded through public donations.

Rockhampton Art Gallery seeks, with the recommendation from Rockhampton Art Gallery Philanthropy Board, the acquisition of the three (3) artworks to Rockhampton Art Gallery collection.

#### Does it comply with the Rockhampton Art Gallery Collection Plan?

The Rockhampton Art Gallery collection is regarded as one of the finest in regional Australia. Rockhampton Mayor Rex Pilbeam in the late 1970s built a representative collection of modern Australian art that has been continued by the Gallery's directors and curators. The collection features works by significant Australian artists such as Arthur Boyd, Sidney Nolan, John Olsen, David Aspden, Charles Blackman, Grace Cossington-Smith, Vida Lahey, Judy Cassab, Noel Counihan, Lloyd Rees, Clifton Pugh, Jeffrey Smart and Brett Whiteley, William Robinson, Robert Juniper, Jon Cattapan and Ken Done. Building on the foundations of Rockhampton Art Gallery's nationally significant painting Collection, The Gold Award acts to ensure the Collection's ongoing relevance to artists and arts practice, as well as visitors and community. As contemporary Australian painting challenges the notions and traditions of painting as a medium, The Gold Award concurrently tracks and reflects this.

The Gold Award, a national invitation painting award with an acquisitive cash prize of \$50,000 made possible through a generous bequest from the Estate of Moya Gold. Designed as an invitation award to consider the best in contemporary painting while simultaneously building a substantive collection, the most outstanding work or works by an artist are awarded the \$50,000 cash prize. As an acquisitive award, The Gold Award is the Gallery's opportunity to remain abreast of the development of contemporary art practice, and to identify gaps in the Collection holdings, and actively seek to close them. Moya Gold's generous bequest to the Rockhampton Art Gallery Trust led to the development of The Gold Award in 2012. Moya, a teacher and lover of the arts requested her gift be used by the Rockhampton Art Gallery for the purchase of Australian paintings.

Jesse, a bar manager at Penrith Leagues left his wife and started living with Raul the assistant groundsman is proposed for acquisition under the 'Australia Art' main collecting strength, with relevance to the 'Modern and Contemporary' sub-collection.

Artist Biography/Curriculum Vitae

#### Biography

Dale Frank is a contemporary Australian artist. Best known for his colourful paintings, he also works with sculpture, performance, and installation, all of which adhere closely to his unique mode of biomorphic abstraction. Composed of a series of pours, drips, and marks, Frank's compositions meld to create images fluctuating between representation and abstraction. Born in New South Wales, Australia in 1959, he left his home country in 1968 to pursue his art career in Europe and the United States. Frank began working with performance and later invoked themes of spectacle productions, such as pool championships, hypnotism, and DJ sets. Frank's artwork has gained international acclaim, including solo exhibitions at the MoMA PS1 Contemporary Art Center in New York in 1981 and at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Sydney in 2000.

Building on the foundations of Rockhampton Art Gallery's nationally significant painting Collection, The Gold Award acts to ensure the Collection's ongoing relevance to artists and arts practice, as well as visitors and community. As contemporary Australian painting challenges the notions and traditions of painting as a medium, The Gold Award concurrently tracks and reflects this.

The Gold Award, a national invitation painting award with an acquisitive cash prize of \$50,000 made possible through a generous bequest from the Estate of Moya Gold. Designed as an invitation award to consider the best in contemporary painting while simultaneously building a substantive collection, the most outstanding work or works by an artist are awarded the \$50,000 cash prize. As an acquisitive award, The Gold Award is the Gallery's opportunity to identify gaps in the Collection holdings, and actively seek to close them. Moya Gold's generous bequest to the Rockhampton Art Gallery Trust led to the development of The Gold Award in 2012. Moya, a teacher and lover of the arts requested her gift be used by the Rockhampton Art Gallery for the purchase of Australian paintings.

The Gold Award is now the major vehicle for growing this nationally significant collection. The diverse practices of the finalist artists is an invaluable means to which Rockhampton Art Gallery is broadening its future ability to tell the story of Australian painting. Through the Gold Award, Rockhampton Art Gallery has acquired works by renowned artists including the likes of Sally Gaboori (2012), Imants Tiller (2014), Jon Cappatan (2016) and Richard Bell (2018). Over the past 10 years Tony Albert has achieved extraordinary visibility and much critical acclaim for his visual art practice, which combines text, video, drawing, painting and three-dimensional objects. This year he was awarded a prestigious residency at the International Studio & Curatorial Program in New York and unveiled a major new monument in Sydney's Hyde Park dedicated to Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander military service. In *Confessions*, Lewer investigates catholic confessionals. In creating the installation, he revisited his childhood ritual, attending confession at a Catholic church in Fitzroy, Melbourne. The small room was divided by perforated pegboard, a material which evokes memories of a grandfather's tool shed and domesticity, and the ideal support for Lewer's text paintings. The resulting installation consists of multiple text panels painted like brightly coloured warnings, filled with the artist's sins.

The bravely honest, humorous and confronting confessions cover the wall. They are variously morals to live by, words of warning, random thoughts, and vernacular poetry. The Pegboard confessions are both admissions to which we can all relate, and a transparent, self-reflexive expression of Lewer's thinking and working process.

As a collection that aims to be representative of Australian painting from modernism to today, Richard Lewer is an artist who contributes to the narrative as contemporary social realism.

#### How does it comply with the Rockhampton Art Gallery Collection Plan

Exhibited in The Gold Award 2018, Confessions was recorded as the public's most engaging work. The Gallery found visitors would spend hours with the work, associating themselves to the statements. It is through the public response that Rockhampton Art Gallery is seeking to purchase this work for the collection.

Rockhampton Mayor Rex Pilbeam in the late 1970s built a representative collection of modern Australian art that has been continued by the Gallery's directors and curators. The collection features works by significant Australian artists such as Arthur Boyd, Sidney Nolan, John Olsen, David Aspden, Charles Blackman, Grace Cossington-Smith, Vida Lahey, Judy Cassab, Noel Counihan, Lloyd Rees, Clifton Pugh, Jeffrey Smart and Brett Whiteley, William Robinson, Robert Juniper, Jon Cattapan and Ken Done. Building on the foundations of Rockhampton Art Gallery's nationally significant painting Collection, The Gold Award acts to ensure the Collection's ongoing relevance to artists and

arts practice, as well as visitors and community. As contemporary Australian painting challenges the notions and traditions of painting as a medium, The Gold Award concurrently tracks and reflects this.

The Gold Award, a national invitation painting award with an acquisitive cash prize of \$50,000 made possible through a generous bequest from the Estate of Moya Gold. Designed as an invitation award to consider the best in contemporary painting while simultaneously building a substantive collection, the most outstanding work or works by an artist are awarded the \$50,000 cash prize. As an acquisitive award, The Gold Award is the Gallery's opportunity to identify gaps in the Collection holdings, and actively seek to close them. Moya Gold's generous bequest to the Rockhampton Art Gallery Trust led to the development of The Gold Award in 2012. Moya, a teacher and lover of the arts requested her gift be used by the Rockhampton Art Gallery for the purchase of Australian paintings.

The Gold Award is now the major vehicle for growing this nationally significant collection. The diverse practices of the finalist artists are an invaluable means to which Rockhampton Art Gallery is broadening its future ability to tell the story of Australian painting. Through the Gold Award, Rockhampton Art Gallery has acquired works by renowned artists including the likes of Sally Gaboori (2012), Imants Tiller (2014), Jon Cappatan (2016) and Richard Bell (2018). Paintings by Ben Quilty, Michael Zavros, Victoria Reikholt, Jason Benjamin, Del Kathryn Barton and Kate Shaw have also been added to the collection through the Cultural gift Program, donated by artists and private collectors, and through purchase by Friends of Rockhampton Art Gallery, former Rockhampton Art Gallery Trust, and Rockhampton Regional Council, and donors through the Rockhampton Art Gallery Gift Fund. As with previous years, Confessions has been identified as a significant acquiring of Rockhampton Art Gallery's collection.



### SUMMARY

Under Chapter 6 Part 3 Division 3 Clause 235 of the Local Government Regulation 2012 to have Council resolve both or either "that it is satisfied that there is only one supplier who is reasonably available" and "because of the specialised or confidential nature of the services that are sought, it would be impractical or disadvantageous for the local government to invite guotes or tenders".

Under this clause this report seeks to engage artists, cultural advisors and specialist contractors to be engaged for the development and implementation of a large scale public artwork.

### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

- 1. The report be accepted.
- 2. The artists, cultural advisor and lighting specialist be approved as a sole supplier to Council in accordance with s.235(a) of the *Local Government Regulation 2012.*

### BACKGROUND

In response to the cultural significance and growing tourism driver of the barramundi in the Fitzroy River, a large public artwork that celebrates the barramundi has been developed. The barramundi artwork will celebrate local culture, histories, Rockhampton's unique fishing tourism and deliver an iconic 'instagrammable' attraction.

Located on Quay Street the public artwork will leverage off the structure of the lift tower at Rod Laver Plaza to create scale within a cost effective resource allocation. The Barramundi is proposed to leap up the lift tower supported by a shower of light, as if it had caught the rays of the Rockhampton sun. It will be highly visible day and night from the river and the riverfront promenade. This sculpture will reflect past and present histories of the region and contribute to the artistic heritage of the city.

The Darumbal Elders have been consulted on the development and design of this public artwork because of the cultural significance of the barramundi, and they have endorsed the design for fabrication.

To develop, fabricate and install this large scale public artwork there are skills and expertise of visual artist, audio artist, lighting designer and cultural advisor that are required. Due to the nature of the work that they undertake *there is only one supplier who is reasonably available*, these specialists are:

<u>Visual artist – Darumbal Enterprise.</u> Due to the cultural significance of the barramundi Darumbal Enterprise recommended the original artwork for interpretation be of large scale with specific lighting treatment. Due to the selection of the artwork there is only one visual artist, Darumbal Enterprise, able to supply the artwork.

<u>Audio artist – Jacob McQuire</u>. Artist identifying and recognised as Darumbal is working in the discipline of oral histories and audio. Due to the cultural significance of the Barramundi Darumbal Enterprise preferred artists engaged in the project to be of Darumbal cultural heritage. There is only one known audio artist of Darumbal heritage living in the region.

<u>Lighting designer - Smart Tech CQ</u>. Local fabricator based in Rockhampton who is aware of the existing infrastructure of Rockhampton Riverside Precinct, and is capable and available to design and fabricate an artistic lighting treatment which will integrate with the existing smart technology and Audio Visual equipment on the Rockhampton Riverside Precinct. Smart Tech CQ is the one supplier who is reasonably available.

<u>Cultural advisor – Darumbal Enterprise</u> – The Enterprise takes responsibility for the commercial business interests of the Darumbal community with regard to commercial business relating to native title and cultural heritage management. As the Barramundi is culturally significant to Darumbal people Darumbal Enterprise is the only (one) supplier who is reasonably available.

### BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

To enable the project to meet budget the:

- a. Project will be managed internally by the Rockhampton Art Gallery, and
- b. Fabrication done locally by sole suppliers listed above and one (1) prequalified supplier.

This revised internal management and local fabrication ensures that the project will be undertaken and delivered within the 2018/2019 budget allocation.

### CONCLUSION

A public artwork has been developed for Quay Street on the lift shaft at Rod Laver Plaza. Due to the nature of the work *only one supplier is reasonably available*. This report seeks the engagement of the listed artists, cultural advisors and specialist contractors as sole suppliers to Council in accordance with s.235(a) of the Local Government Regulation 2012 to undertake development and implementation of this large scale public artwork.



Mount Morgan Rodeo Association and its predecessors regularly run an annual Rodeo at the Mount Morgan Showgrounds, which has been frequently accompanied by a Family Fun Day. The Association has recently been successful in receiving funding to support their endeavors.

The association seeks to apply these funds towards a portable building to serve as meeting room and first aid/site office during the Rodeo.

Council officers have met representatives of the Mount Morgan Rodeo Association on site and consider that the building can be successfully located on site provided that the Association meet appropriate site improvements, modification and approval requirements.

Other users and tenants of the show grounds have expressed their support for this proposal and the Mount Morgan Rodeo Association have stated their intention to provide access and support to other users via the building when possible.

The Association have requested that Council consider waiving any building site lease fee.

### CONCLUSION





#### First Five Forever

The importance of outreach has been highlighted this month. We attended 3 community events – Playgroup Qld's Messy Play May, Linking the Generations' markets, and Romp In the Park. Library staff met with almost 1500 visitors at the library stalls at these events. Many of these visitors do not attend library sessions and these outreach events allow the First Five Forever Officer to deliver the F5F message to a much broader section of the community and welcome 99 new library members. Overall this month, through both outreach and internal programing, we were able to engage with 1699 community members and join 146 new library members.

Our other major event in May is always the National Simultaneous Storytime event on May 22. Southside Library invited a number of guests along to meet with the children, including Mel and Branton from Leaholme Rise Alpacas – who shared a number of products made from Alpaca fleece and gave the children information about Alpacas, Shanka who shared the beautiful, calming music of Nepalese Bowls, and Cr Rose Swadling who read the 2019 NSS book – Alpacas with Maracas. There were 64 attendees at the Southside NSS session, with the children thoroughly engaged with all of the guests and activities.

#### Rockhampton History Centre

The Rockhampton History Centre received a donated USB of historic photographs of Rockhampton landscapes, buildings, businesses, transport, and people.

The photographs were placed onto a continuous slide show to run on computers and TV screens in the library. This project was completed as part of a course delivered through the Library's Technology Centre.

During the month, History Centre staff were kept busy completing 31 additional queries as a result of Council's Strategic Planning teams *Character Overlay* mail out. This mail out was sent to households in the areas of Allenstown, Wandal, and The Range, and included advice to homeowners to contact the History Centre for information on the history of their house. Research carried out by staff included Council's valuation rates books (1865 to 1973), newspaper articles, electoral rolls, and Councils' GeoGortex database. These sources enabled staff to discover when a house was first noted on the land, who the first owner was, how long they lived in the house, and what their life was like. The History Centre Staff are appreciative of being included by the Strategic Planning section as it provided a wonderful opportunity to showcase collections and research skills to a wider audience.

#### Library Technology Centre

The Pearson Vue Testing Centre has been very well utilised in the past two months with 23 clients sitting for their Chartered Accountants exams, two Lactation exams and one Cisco assessment. The revenue generated by administering these exams just for this period was \$619.24.

#### Childcare

Childcare Director, Kylie Hoare attended Messy Play Day and Romp in the Park with the Libraries First Five Forever outreach. This was a great way to actively promote the Centre to potential new families and model positive play.

The Preschool room have been looking at bees and how they make honey. We were fortunate to have William's grandparents come in and bring a hive in. The children sat eagerly awaiting the show. They learnt all about the hive and there are around 20000 bees in each hive and each bee has a job to do. They were informed on how the bees collected the nectar and pollen and, how it was turned into honey in each cell of the comb.

The Shearing Shed played host to a wide variety of functions and events for May. Staff catered for an RFDS Morning Tea, a consultation session by Council with Volunteers on the new direction for the Heritage Village, a family reunion, a Cancer Council High Tea and a two day IPWEA Branch Conference. Many Council staff attended the conference and after the sessions enjoyed touring the Village, particularly the Power House with 32 stationary engines on display.

Other visitors to the Village include a tour from Bayview Towers and Gracemere and Emerald State Schools. Students were keen to spot differences between early built Rosewood Homestead, Lakes Creek workers cottage and today's modern housing. Not only their construction techniques but the layout of the houses with external kitchens and toilet facilities.

Arts CQ continued rehearsals at Dingley Cottage and the Hospital in preparation for the Heritage Festival on the first weekend in June while Horses Helping Humans kept busy with boosted numbers attending sessions from the local region.

The Heritage Village has been awarded \$300,000 from the Works for Queensland Program to progress the lighting upgrades, including hazard lighting for emergency helicopter landing, pathway lighting and a public announcement system which will allow the introduction of events in the cool of the evening.

Volunteers continue repairs to the Hospital Post Office, the phone box outside Arnolds which has been subject to some vandalism and doors and windows on some of the cottages. Maintenance also continues on vehicles used for rides in the Village at weddings and on tours and school holiday activities. New risers have been built to add to the portable stage for the 'Clogging' demonstration and 'Reverse Strip' at the Amphitheatre for the Heritage Festival.

May Markets celebrated not only Mother's Day but the 21<sup>st</sup> birthday for the Heritage Village. Mother's attending the market were able to go in a draw for a cosmetics basket donated by Revlon. To celebrate turning 21, Cr Drew Wickerson created a fabulous stage coach and Clydesdale birthday cake and addresses were made by Mayor Strelow and Cr Rose Swadling.

In addition, Topology provided a cinematic and live music performance. 'Queensland at Home' is a performance of an original musical score by Topology's Robert Davidson accompanying historical footage from the early 1900s of Queenslanders engaging in everyday activities. There was also two short films about the Rockhampton area featuring original music by local young composers: Lachlan Moulds and Isaac Graham. The markets again showed increase numbers.


The Rockhampton Eisteddfod was held at the Pilbeam Theatre and Walter Reid Cultural Centre over April and May.


Anh Do performed The Happiest Refugee live on stage on 23 May. The show is based on his book of the same name.



#### CQ Home Assist Secure

In the month of May, the CQ Home Assist Secure unit continued to embrace our RRC "One Team" approach and once again secured considerable help from The Department of Housing and Public Works for a client and rate payer in need of assistance due to ill health. We were alerted of the client's position by our Local Laws area and worked together to help with costs involved in a large \$2500 clean-up of the property. One of our Admin team visited and stepped through the processes with the gentleman and assisted him in setting up Lawn Mowing vouchers to eliminate the risk of this problem reoccurring. A great outcome for all involved with no infringements being issued to an elderly, ill resident with the property being cleaned up and brought up to a satisfactory standard for surrounding neighbours.

May was the scheduled month also for our Community Hazard Inspection. We thank Chris Newsome for his guidance with this as we are happy to report that we have updated notice boards and also allocated some staff resources to cleaning up the stock room store rooms upstairs.

With the aged and disability care market place changing rapidly over the past 12 months and continuing to do so into the immediate future, staff have been busy attending meetings in May with the intent to conform and deliver our services as per the new Aged Care Quality Standards which are to be introduced from the 1st July 2019. Maree, our Supervisor attended a meeting hosted by the Australian Government Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission based on preparing for the new standards. At our Monthly Staff Meeting in May we delivered a staff presentation to explain the eight, Aged Care Quality Standards which herald a change for all involved in the aged care sector.

In May, team members also attended an NDIS provider update and Q & A Meeting as well as the quarterly Rockhampton Community Service Network Meeting. These quarterly meetings are very engaging and assist us in being connected with other great services in our community like Meals on Wheels, senior advocacy groups, home nursing services etc and we are able to grasp an idea of wait times for assessments and occupational therapists services.

Many of the works have social, and sometimes political, resonances and take as their point of departure: the human body, its dimensions, the spaces it occupies, the narratives that contain it and the theatre or spectacle that unfolds around it. Five school groups visited the Safe Space touring exhibition during May. These groups range from Year 2 to Year 11. All of these groups were provided with a 15-minute free introductory guided tour of the exhibition, led by a member of Art Gallery staff.	

John Brack: Works on Paper draws from the Gallery's nationally significant collection to present a collection of works that speak to the human condition, and the way we see and perceive the human form. John Brack's representative images defined the society of post war urban Australia through a visual commentary that incorporated irony, humour, and metaphor; all wrapped up in a sophisticated nod to art history. The double-sided works hang suspended from the ceiling and respond to each other in gentle, contemplative unison. The exhibition has been specifically designed as a potential touring show that will extend the Collection's reach and continue to build a broader appreciation of its significant holdings.

*Stitched:* by Brady Neher is the sum of simple parts: cloth and thread skilfully rendered in meticulous detail with slow precision by the artist's own hand. Born in Germany to American parents, Brady Nerher embodies the hypothesis that people will gravitate towards areas of work that fit their names. Brady Neher was destined to sew as a 'Neher', the German occupational name for a tailor or embroiderer.

Through the activities of Curatorial Programs the community has been supported in the development of and creative participation in the arts through the program development and implementation supporting the exhibitions *Brack: works on paper* and *Safe Space: Contemporary Australian Sculpture*. As well as the provision of free community based programs including Darumbal Storytime, Art Walks and Artist Anonymous.

During the month of May, Rockhampton Art Gallery hosted several one-day workshops. These included: Bird Mosaic Wall Art workshop, which saw 10 participants; The Art of Soap Making, which saw 15 participants. Due to the popularity of the Art of Soap Making, a further three workshops have been organised for later in the year. The four-week Watercolour Wisdom course concluded this month. There were 11 participants.

The first 2019 Winter Artist Market was held on 26th May. This was attended by 7 marketeers made up of 13 artists.






