Dear Evan,

The Capricorn Pest Management Group (CPMG) has been in existence for 14 years. The purpose of the Group is to ensure a coordinated approach to pest management in central Queensland and providing 'on ground' outcomes in terms of strategic pest control actions. With a focus on strategic 'on-ground' outcomes the Group has been responsible for an injection of over \$1.5million worth of projects in the region to assist landholders, industry and regional councils manage invasive species.

The group was formed in conjunction will all regional councils including Rockhampton Regional Council (RRC) who are vital to the functioning of the group and implementation of projects. This collaborative effort between the Councils and stakeholder members has greatly assisted in ameliorating the impacts of pests throughout the region. This partnership has also been instrumental in building relationships with landholders, community and industry groups.

Rockhampton Regional Council has previously committed staff and resources in the interests of maintaining weed and pest animal management activities including resource and training initiatives. The resource sharing days provide a collective approach to weed control and involve pest management officers from the regional council areas working together with landholders to minimise the impacts of weeds in the environment.

The CPMG structure is currently being used as a template for the co-investment funding model currently being proposed by the LGAQ, BQ and NRM Groups for implementation across the state. Therefore involvement of all regional Councils is important to ensuring the continued success of the Group.

As RRC goes through the process of de-amalgamation we would like you to consider the importance of Group and the function it plays in coordinating, training and networking in central Queensland.

We are currently seeking membership from your Council for the period 2013-2014 to assist in maintaining pest management initiatives across Central Queensland. Membership for this period is \$17,760 (GST Inc).

The funding supplied by your Council will allow the group to maintain its status and position as the peak weed and pest animal management body in Queensland and also facilitate future implementation of strategic projects and allocation of funding.

Commensurate with your membership, please nominate two (2) Councillor representatives from Rockhampton Regional Council as Members on the CPMG Management Committee.

Once again I would like to thank your Council for your continued contribution to the efforts and successes of the Group and for ensuring that pest management activities remain focused throughout the region.

SUMMARY

This report presents a Pest Survey Program for consideration by Council. Prior to Rockhampton Regional Council's pest management staff undertaking property inspections for pest plants, a Pest Survey Program must be approved by Council.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT in accordance with the Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002, Council approves the Pest Survey Program, as detailed in Attachment 1 of the report, for the localities of Alton Downs between Tuesday 1 April 2014 and Monday 30 June 2014.

COMMENTARY

The attached Pest Survey Program identifies the area to be surveyed, the timeframe and other details required by the Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002.

BACKGROUND

The Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002 requires that prior to a Local Government undertaking property inspections for pests, it must approve a Pest Survey Program.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The staffing and associated costs to undertake the Pest Survey Program are provided for in the 2013-2014 Natural Resource Management budget.

LEGISLATIVE CONTEXT

Local Government is responsible for the administration of the Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002 (the Act).

The *Act* provides that Local Governments must ensure private property owners are making a reasonable effort to control declared pest plants on their properties. The *Act* identifies the Pest Survey Program as a process for Local Government to assess the level of adherence by private property owners to the various requirements of the *Act*.

The *Act* also requires Local Government to advertise the Pest Survey Program in a local newspaper two weeks prior to the commencement of the program.

STAFFING IMPLICATIONS

The inspection program requires the equivalent of one full time pest management officer for the period of the Pest Survey Program.

RISK ASSESSMENT

An assessment regarding Workplace Health and Safety considerations has identified all activities associated with the implementation of the Pest Survey Program as low risk.

CORPORATE/OPERATIONAL PLAN

The Pest Survey Program has been identified as an action within Council's Pest Management Plan.

CONCLUSION

This report presents to Council a Pest Survey Program for consideration and approval. The implementation of this Pest Survey Program assists Council to fulfill its responsibilities under the *Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002* by allowing Council to assess the pest plant infestation on private property in the identified focus areas. It also allows Council to assess the property owner's adherence to the various requirements of the *Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002.*

PEST SURVEY PROGRAM

Survey area:

Property inspections will be conducted throughout part of the Rockhampton Regional Council area focusing on the localities of Alton Downs.

Area Selection Criteria:

The focus areas are a portion of Rockhampton Regional Council for which inspection by authorised persons is feasible within three months, and are considered a high priority for identifying declared pest plants in accordance with Council's Pest Management Plan.

Program Purpose:

- To monitor compliance with the Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management)

 Act 2002 in relation to declared pests
- To aid in monitoring and mapping the distribution and spread of declared plants

Properties Inspected:

Inspections will be conducted on urban and rural properties within the above stated areas.

Commencement and Duration of Survey:

This survey will commence on Tuesday 1 April 2014 and will be in force for a period of three months expiring on Monday 30 June 2014. Properties will be inspected from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday to Friday.

SUMMARY

This report provides information about the activities of Rockhampton Regional Council's Natural Resource Management Unit (the Unit) for the period 1 October to 31 December 2013. The Unit consists of three separate work teams namely Pest Management, Vector Management and Land Rehabilitation.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Natural Resource Management Activity Statement for October to December 2013 be received.

BACKGROUND

This report outlines the notable outcomes of the teams during the period October – December 2013. Attachment 1 provides numerical data on the activities of the Vector Management Unit during this period. Complete numerical data for pest management activities was not available and therefore has not been included in this report. Information on the activities of the Land Rehabilitation Unit was not available.

COMMENTARY

PEST MANAGEMENT

The Pest Management work team is responsible for controlling declared pest plants and animals on Council land. The team also works closely with private landholders to ensure that reasonable control is occurring on private properties. The *Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002* requires local governments to undertake the above roles.

On 5 December 2013 a Wild Dog Meeting was held with landholders representing Riverslea, Gogango ,Stanwell, Kabra, Dalma, Glenroy, Marmor and Stanwell corp areas.

Biosecurity Bill

The *Biosecurity Bill 2012* (the Bill) was introduced to Queensland Parliament on 19 November 2013 and will result in the amendment of a number of pieces of legislation including the *Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002.*


Officers provided comment to LGAQ for inclusion in their submission. The impacts of the changes are not clear at this stage. Council will be kept updated.

VECTOR MANAGEMENT

The Vector Management work team is responsible for controlling vector agents on Council land and for ensuring vector agents are prevented from breeding on private properties. The Vector Management team's primary role is to proactively manage mosquitoes and vermin. Its secondary role is to respond in a timely manner to customer requests regarding vector management.

The main focus of the Vector Management team is to minimise the risk of vector-borne diseases (such as dengue fever, Ross River virus and Barmah Forest virus) to the local community. The team works closely with Queensland Health in surveying properties in the region to determine the presence of vector agents. Queensland Health provides data on the occurrence of vector-borne diseases in the region.

Attachment 1 – Vector Management Activities provides detailed numerical data on the activities of this work team. The following discussion focuses on notable points associated with vector management during the period October – December 2013.

Notable points discussed include:

- (1) Surveillance of salt marsh areas;
- (2) Surveillance of freshwater areas;
- (3) Disease notifications; and
- (4) Complaints and enquiries from Council's customer request system.

Surveillance of Salt Marsh Areas

Increased surveillance of salt marsh areas in the region is an identified action in Council's *Vector Management Plan 2010-2014*. This is a proactive management strategy which will provide increased mosquito control to the communities of Rockhampton Regional Council.

During the period October – December 2013 the following surveillance was undertaken:

Fitzroy River: Scheduled surveillance, which is based on inundating tides greater than 4.3 metres flooding salt marsh sites adjacent to the Fitzroy River, was undertaken on two occasions with a total of twenty four sites sampled. Mosquito breeding was found on five of these sites. The breeding was below threshold, therefore no treatment was necessary.

Capricorn Coast (Keppel Sands to northern Yeppoon): Scheduled surveillance, which is triggered by inundating tides greater than 4.3 metres, was undertaken with thirty three sites sampled. Above-threshold mosquito breeding was found in one of these sites, which were treated with the terrestrial application of larvacide. Post-treatment sampling indicated a 100 per centum larva mortality rate.

Rockhampton Urban: Scheduled surveillance, which is based on inundating tides greater than four metres, was undertaken and eleven sites were sampled. Above-threshold mosquito breeding was found in one of these sites, which were treated with the terrestrial application of larvacide. Post-treatment sampling indicated a 100 per centum larva mortality rate

Surveillance of Freshwater Areas

During the period October – December 2013 surveillance of sixty-five freshwater sites was undertaken. Above-threshold mosquito breeding was found in two of these sites, which were treated with the terrestrial application of larvacide. Post-treatment sampling indicated a 100 per centum larva mortality rate.

Disease Notifications

Queensland Health is responsible for monitoring the occurrence of all diseases in Queensland. Queensland Health regularly provides Council with data on the occurrence of disease transmitted by mosquitoes.

During the period October – December 2013, one case of dengue fever was recorded in the Rockhampton Region. Queensland Health advised that a person holidaying in Bali and on returning presented to their Doctor with flu like symptoms. The test was confirmed as Dengue Fever which the person had contracted whilst in Bali. Due to the person being in the viraemic stage Rockhampton Regional Council Vector Management Officers assisted Queensland Health Officers in undertaking a surveillance and control program covering a two hundred square metre zone around the case house. A total of twenty properties where surveyed, of which nine were found to have containers breeding mosquitoes.

Mosquito larva samples were taken from nineteen containers. No *Aedes agypti* were identified in the samples taken. Containers holding water were either emptied, treated or removed.

For the purpose of comparison, the following table provides data relevant to Mackay Regional Council, Rockhampton Regional Council and Gladstone Regional Council for the period October – December 2013.


There is no trend in the distribution of the diagnosed cases of Barmah Forest virus, Ross River virus or dengue fever within the Rockhampton Regional Council area.




COMMENTARY

ANNUAL INSPECTIONS






Parking Infringements Comparison Year to Date November 2013








